concentration camps in Poland. When she first heard about it, she wrote, "I didn't know if I should go. I told myself I am not really connected to it because it didn't reach Ethiopia."

But Rivka decided it was very important to her as a Jew, so she worked long hours the entire summer to pay for the expensive trip.

She wrote that she had previously heard the story of the Holocaust only "from outside", but since the trip to the camps she feels a strong connection to the people and to the events that took place.

In her own words, Rivka said: "...we saw a mountain filled entirely with human ashes. It was very difficult to see it because it is so difficult to imagine these were people and now only their ashes remain. There are no names, and nothing is left..."

"At the end of the journey" she continued, "I felt very proud for being Jewish and being in Israel, the Promised Land that they dreamt of coming to. Thanks to them we were able to establish it."

She wrote that she is studying hard now to succeed in her matriculation exams. After 12th grade she will join the army, she said, to serve the country. And then, on to college.

When Rivka was only in 8th grade, she liked to say: "If you smile at the world, the world will smile back at you. Everything is for the best."

Rivka's story is exceptional and yet representative of the commitment of young Ethiopian Israelis to become the best that they can be.

And sponsors like you enable them to reach that goal.

Fentia asked me good questions...I gave her my email and What's App number in case she wanted to write me. She had just gotten email the day before.

Her favorite class is English and she said that she has some talent in it. I knew one of her previous teachers from the elementary school across the street. We both agreed how wonderful Fentia is.

Meeting Fentia made the project much more "real" for me. Thanks for organizing it.
